The Area Newsletter is a communication vehicle serving Western Washington Area 72 (WWA72). The scope includes WWA72 business, i.e. election results, committee appointments, motions, discussion topics, special committee activities, status of WWA72 trusted servants, and content provided by members of the Western Washington fellowship intended to carry the message of AA to the still suffering alcoholic.

The Newsletter also includes a calendar of events, which prominently features a categorized list of the dates and times of Area Service events, and other AA related events occurring throughout the Western Washington fellowship, i.e., campouts, luncheons, and picnics. Fliers related to the above events, registration, contribution, and subscription forms are consolidated in a separate section. Districts’ reports are encouraged.

The Newsletter Editor requests content each month from the WWA72 Committee, in particular elected & appointed officers, standing committees, special committees, Intergroups & Central Service Offices, and the DCMs for each of the 44 districts. All the above are encouraged to submit content that features a method of carrying the message in their sphere of duties.

The author’s first name, at minimum, will accompany all submissions. The Editor reserves the right to edit and/or refuse to publish content considered to be inconsistent with the three legacies: Recovery, Unity, and Service, with particular scrutiny given to content perceived to contain foul language and/or personal attacks.

The Newsletter is intended to be shared with all the members of the Western Washington fellowship and relies on the WWA72 Committee to generate content, overall awareness, and ensure distribution to the groups. It is distributed monthly, free of charge, to WWA72 elected and appointed officers, DCMs, and Alternate DCMs, GSRs of the registered WWA72 groups, past Delegates, GSO, Pacific Region Trustee, reciprocating Pacific Region Newsletter Editors, and the 15 Pacific Region Delegates. Homegroups or individuals may subscribe for \$12 per year by sending send their name, address, and payment to the Western Washington Area Treasurer. The views and opinions expressed in the articles and reports are those of the authors and do not necessarily reflect the official policy or position of the Newsletter Editor, Western Washington Area 72, or Alcoholics Anonymous.

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Publishing & Grapevine Our Big Book, Alcoholics Anonymous, Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, and other books will now be produced jacketless, with jacket images printed on the covers. This change is in response to supply chain disruptions and will help alleviate out-of-stock issues and help keep costs down. Grapevine will be adding a \$2.49 increase to all books. The top 10 selling books’ prices will increase on January 1, 2023, and other books’ prices will increase as they go to reprint. Other ancillary items prices will increase on January 1, 2023, as well.

When I think about the topic of Group Inventory, the first thing that comes to my mind is Tradition One: *“Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon A.A. unity.”* And Tradition Four: *“Each group should be autonomous except in matters affecting other groups or A.A. as a whole.”*

These traditions remind me that, just as I take my own personal inventory to stay spiritually grounded, my home group also benefits from pausing to look at how we’re doing as a collective. For me, a group inventory feels like an opportunity to strengthen unity, improve how we carry the message, and make sure our meeting remains a safe, welcoming space for the still-suffering alcoholic.

My home group does a group inventory every one to two years as part of a regular housekeeping. What’s very important is to also create a list of items to continue discussing and addressing. It’s about applying what we surface to ensure we are fulfilling our primary purpose. Each time, I’m struck by how connected the group feels afterward. Members share more openly, small issues get addressed before they grow, and we are reminded of our purpose. AA’s resources support this activity. The *A.A. Service Manual* encourages groups to periodically look at how well they’re fulfilling our primary purpose, and the pamphlet *“A Group Inventory”* offers thoughtful questions that keep the discussion grounded in principles rather than personalities.

I’ve also come to appreciate having someone from outside the group facilitate the inventory. Whether it’s a local district committee member, someone from our area appointed/electeds, or an experienced member. I find an impartial facilitator allows everyone, including me, to participate fully while keeping the conversation balanced and aligned with the Traditions.

In the end, a group inventory is simply about keeping our group spiritually healthy and focused on carrying the message. I want the hand of AA to always be there for the still suffering alcoholic who hasn’t found our doors yet.

I am so grateful to serve Area 72, the best Area in the Conference!

Greetings Area 72!

Before I get into my thoughts on this newsletter’s topic, I want to encourage members, groups and districts interested in hosting GSR schools to coordinate with me. I have two on the calendar for early 2026: on in the Vancouver area, and the other in Port Orchard. If you would like to attend a GAR school that is closer to you, geographically, reach out to myself or your DCM!

Now to the suggested topic: The Group Inventory. I love the topic of the Group Inventory. I know that I frequently speak about

group inventories but I’m not sure if this wonderful tool is commonly spoken about in more public settings.

When folks come to me with large group concerns, one of my most frequent responses is to suggest a group inventory. Or ask about their last inventory. Similar to my personal inventory, the honesty, consistency and follow through of a group inventory can really be impactful!

I find personal introspection during each group inventory I participate in. Having also had the tremendous honor to facilitate many group inventories, I’ve seen the beauty of the autonomy that Alcoholics Anonymous affords us. Many groups can function in specific and unique ways that would be difficult or less than ideal for other groups. There’s something wonderful about that.

The dogma that has found its way into A.A. groups and A.A. members doesn’t have to drive us. There is no proper way to run a meeting or ideal way for group to structure itself. Yes, our movement has had some growing pains and as a result, some experiences and suggestions, but I reject the notion that some groups do it right, wrong or better than others. I might have personal opinions, but keeping the doors open for as many future alcoholics to find recovery surely should take priority over my judgment of groups. How a group serves their purpose (as often discussed in the first question found on page 29 of “The A.A. Group” pamphlet) is entirely their affair.

I was at a funeral last weekend and I heard numerous examples of how this man loved and served people; he saw the opportunity to help others and he just did. This man knew his job was to serve people and *not* the institution he committed his life to. Through my personal inventory and many group inventories I have experienced peace and confidence that comes when I don’t compare myself or my group to others. I am not threatened, and I can make room for others at the table. If my purpose, today, is to help others who might be interested in this way of life, can I allow myself to do anything less than to be open and available to any and all members and groups?

Finally, I want to thank Erin for all the hard work she has put into producing the Area Newsletter over the last year. It is a thankless job with lots of nuance, especially this past year. Your efforts have not gone unnoticed, Erin. Thank you!

November has been a busy month. In addition to my Area Chair duties of planning for the January Quarterly, including our upcoming Area Inventory on Friday of the Quarterly (more on that below), I had the privilege of sharing my experience, strength and hope at two of our district’s gratitude banquets and attend still

others. A big thank you to District 55 in Sequim and their incredible gratitude banquet with over three hundred in attendance and years and years of sobriety. Thank you, Bill W., for being such a gracious host. And, to District 29 and their event out in Puyallup at the Tacoma Sportsman’s Club, also well attended with over two hundred in attendance and also years and years of sobriety including 59 years! Thank you, Grace and the District 29 Action Log team, their District’s newsletter, for the invitation. Both events felt like homecomings.

Area Inventory in January
Now on to January and the upcoming Area Inventory on Friday night. Our most recent past Pacific Region Trustee, Kathi Fowler, will be flying up to facilitate the inventory and we have assembled a committee to determine format and questions. This year, our inventory will model the General Service Conference’s most recent inventory where we break into groups of ten and work through a list of questions manageable for each group and then the spokesperson from each group will report on their group’s conscience as we work through the questions. Our committee will be using the conference questions as adapted for the Area Committee. I am super excited to see how it goes. At the same time, our former Trusted Servant, Heather C., now Delegate elect for Idaho, Area 18, and is working with their incoming chairperson on a similar approach for their Area Inventory next year. Exciting stuff and I am excited to learn how our Area Committee can improve in years to come as we assess the action items that come out of the inventory process.

National Corrections Conference Bid
And last, our National Corrections Conference (NCC) 2027 Bid Committee, comprised of Area 72 and 92 Corrections servants flew to Nashville in early November to attend the 2025 NCC and bid on 2027. We made a great presentation and I felt very proud and grateful for our showing. Unfortunately, Florida Area 15 flew up to Nashville in mass and also put on a great bid. They loaded their committee with their Area’s Chairperson, Bronwyn F., and Billy N., past General Service Trustee and popular and persuasive member in the Southeast Region who closed their presentation and fielded questions. The voting stayed at about 65% Florida to 35% Washington through four rounds of third legacy procedure and Florida won out of the hat. We had some interesting reflections about this “national” event as it has remained mostly in the eastern half of the U.S. since inception although it will be in Salt Lake City next year. Florida didn’t have a correctional facility to highlight, instead focusing on weather, ease of travel to Orlando, and a boat ride to see alligators versus our presentation which highlighted Washington State Penitentiary Walla Walla and A.A. corrections history, with Walla Walla having the second oldest prison meeting in A.A. history (September 1942) next only to San Quentin earlier that same year. Also, travel into the Tri-Cities area from anywhere not on the west coast requires 1 and 2 stop flights. So we are going to regroup and see about maybe having a regional conference here in the Pacific. There is a need and the national conference seems to have lost some focus on corrections. Still, I was very grateful for the opportunity to be on the bid committee with truly dedicated servants.

Growing Pains and Bidding Gains: A Friendly Reminder on Archives and Hosting Quarterlies

Hi all!

As I’ve reflected on the quarterlies of 2025, we’ve uncovered a small but important lesson: sometimes our district archives might not have that handy EIN verification letter that online payment systems like Stripe need. But don’t worry—this is not a dealbreaker for hosting your quarterly events!

You might remember back in the July 2025 quarterly, we simply opted to go old-school with cash and check payments when we couldn’t get the credit card processor set up in time. Sure, it was a bit of a headache for some folks and we heard a few grumbles, but it worked out. The reason? That district didn’t have the original EIN verification letter on hand, and Stripe (like other processors) needed it to verify our business identity.

Now, this is really just a friendly reminder: check in with your archivist and make sure your district’s treasury documentation is complete. It’s not the end of the world if it’s missing—you can always host a quarterly without credit card payments if you need to, or open a new EIN and bank account if that makes things easier. But a little preparation can go a long way.

Speaking of preparation, I’d also like to put out a warm invitation: we’re looking for districts to team up and put together co-hosted bids to host a 2027 quarterly. We’ll be hearing those bids in April, and I’m more than happy to personally help any district through the process. It’s really straightforward: just reach out to me,

take a peek at the area handbook for the details, and I’ll help you brainstorm and gather info from your venue. I promise to make it as smooth and comfortable as possible!

In short, there’s nothing to be afraid of when it comes to putting together a bid. I’m here to support you and make sure you feel confident and ready to present your ideas. Let’s make 2027’s quarterly planning just as seamless and welcoming as possible.

In Alcoholics Anonymous, inventories, whether they are personal or group inventories, serve as important tools for growth and understanding. Early in my sobriety, I often found the idea of an inventory intimidating. Looking honestly at resentments, fears, and past behaviors felt uncomfortable, and admitting these realities out loud felt even more so. Over time, however, as I practiced taking inventories and became more willing to prioritize sobriety over the desire to appear strong or untroubled, the process became not only manageable but deeply beneficial.

Today, a personal inventory simply means checking in with myself. It is an opportunity to identify what is working well, what may need attention, and where I might be experiencing discomfort. Just as importantly, it is a chance to

recognize the positive qualities and actions that I want to continue developing. This ongoing practice strengthens my relationships and supports my spiritual growth.

I have come to understand group inventories in a similar way. For some of us, the word “inventory” can carry the implication that something is wrong, but I have learned that this is not the case. A group inventory does not indicate a crisis; rather, it provides a structured, respectful space for a home group to reflect on how it is functioning.

One experience stands out from a group inventory I once helped facilitate. A trusted servant who faithfully fulfilled a cleanup commitment each week shared that they had been doing the work alone for quite some time and were feeling unappreciated and unseen. No one in the group had realized this. The inventory process allowed them to express their experience honestly, and the group responded with understanding and willingness to help. The result was not blame or defensiveness, but a healthier distribution of service responsibilities and greater connection within the group.

In another inventory, a member shared that they had felt micromanaged while coordinating an event, despite being a professional event planner. Although this individual had been elected as a trusted servant, they felt their judgment was not trusted. The inventory gave them a safe environment to express their feelings and to be heard respectfully.

Experiences such as these illustrate that inventories are not always about fault-finding. They are about cultivating awareness, strengthening unity, and supporting continued growth. Just as I take personal inventories to assess my actions, identify areas for improvement, and acknowledge progress, group inventories allow our home groups to reflect on their functioning, address concerns openly, and affirm what they are doing well.

Ultimately, inventory is a pathway toward healthier communication and deeper

connection, whether in our personal lives, our service roles, or within the AA fellowship. When approached with honesty and willingness, inventories become valuable opportunities to realign with our principles and strengthen our ties with one another.

“Group Inventory: Not Just for ‘Other’ Groups”

December seems to be the month when we suddenly remember a certain section of the A.A. Group pamphlet and the Group Handbook—the part with all those group inventory questions we say we’re going to use “someday.”

Questions like:

- What is the basic purpose of our group?
- Are we doing all we can to carry the message?
- Do we do our fair share toward supporting our local services?

Most of us read those questions the way we used to read warning labels on alcohol: we glance, we nod, and we think, “Yes, someone really ought to look at that.”

But the longer I’ve been in A.A., the more I see that Group Inventory isn’t about blame or fault-finding. It’s exactly what the literature says it is: a chance for the group to ask, together, “Are we still doing what we were formed to do?”

Some groups use the list from the A.A. Group pamphlet / Group Handbook and answer a few questions at a time. Some set aside a meeting and focus on unity, service, and carrying the message. Others rotate inventory topics over several months. The format can differ, but the spirit is the same:

- We pause.
- We listen to each other.
- We let our Higher Power into the group’s conscience.

And here’s the part that always gets me: a group inventory isn’t about how we look on paper, it’s about how we’re living the Traditions together. Are we inclusive? Are we welcoming newcomers? Are we supporting the services that help us stay sober? Are we still putting A.A.’s primary purpose first, or have we drifted?

This month’s theme—Group Inventory—is an invitation for all of us to:

- Dust off that inventory section of the Group pamphlet,
- Pick a few questions,
- And let the group conscience speak.

It doesn’t have to be complicated or perfect. It just has to be honest, kind, and grounded in A.A. principles. That’s where the growth is.

1. Recent Accomplishments (Archives Repository)

- Oral Histories

- Completed 1/2 of an oral history with a member from District 43.
- Completed an oral history with a past Delegate (Panel 23).
- Audio Digitization
 - Successfully digitized a cassette (BACKWARDS!) using our Repository equipment that has not been operable since 2020, by:
 - Installing a new sound card, and
 - Using new software that works with Windows 10.
- National Archives History Project
 - Currently working with the founder of the National A.A. Archives Workshop (NAAAW) to construct the first written history of this 30-year-old workshop.
- Regional Archives Workshop
 - Hosted a regional Archives workshop at the Repository.
 - Area 58 led the hands-on preservation tasks.
 - Attendance:
 - 20 people in person at the Repository
 - 13 people online
 - Every in-person attendee left with a clamshell box they built themselves.
- Standing Committee Webpage
 - Jen and I have been working on the Archives Standing Committee webpage.
 - The webpage went live this past month.
- Delegate Outreach Draft
 - I am constructing an email for our Delegate to send to the other 92 Delegates, asking them to:
 - Forward it to their Area Archivists, so that
 - We can share the flyer for the workshop with currently serving Archives people across the country.
- Budget Work
 - Turned in the budget for next year.
 - We are pending some budget rearrangements.

2. Help Needed from the Archives Standing Committee

- Outreach & Contact List
 - Tracking responses from other Areas/ Archivists once the Delegate email goes out.
 - Assistance maintaining an up-to-date list of Archivists and Archives committees who want information about the workshop and Repository activities.

- Oral History Support
 - Members willing to:
 - Assist with scheduling,
 - Sit in on oral histories as a second set of ears, or
 - Help with light editing / formatting of completed transcripts.
- Technical & Security Support
 - Our laptops and PCs are no longer receiving security updates / protection.
 - We need help:
 - Reviewing options to protect our machines, and
 - Identifying a practical, affordable security solution for the Repository’s computers.

3. Pending / Upcoming Obligations

- La Viña Artwork Judging
 - The Repository is scheduled to do the judging of the artwork for La Viña next July here in Area 72.
- Grapevine Literature Quarterly
 - The Grapevine literature quarterly will be held at the Repository in December.
- NAAAW History Project
 - Ongoing work with the founder of the National A.A. Archives Workshop to document its 30-year history.
- Workshop Promotion
 - Once the Delegate email and flyer are finalized and sent, we will:
 - Track who responds,
 - Share workshop information with currently serving Archivists, and
 - Integrate that into our broader Archives planning.
- Repository Technology & Security
 - Follow through on:
 - Computer security solution for the Repository, and
 - Ensuring our equipment remains usable and protected going forward.

Taking Stock Together: The Gift of The Inventory

Depending on when you’re reading this, we may have already completed our Area Inventory, or it may still be ahead of us. Either way, my hope is the same: that the experience

brings us closer together in humility, honesty, and service.

Over the last few years, I’ve had the opportunity, really, the privilege, to facilitate group inventories in District 19 and to participate in group, district, and area inventories. But before I ever sat in one of those circles, everything began with a much more personal kind of stocktaking: my own.

When I first worked Steps Four through Seven, I didn’t have the dramatic “burning bush” moment I half expected. I didn’t have buried secrets eating me alive; I’ve always been something of an open book. My challenge was far more ordinary: I simply couldn’t see myself clearly. I lacked the objectivity to translate my patterns into honest insight. I was too close to the subject.

Listening to Joe and Charlie each night helped me simplify what I had unknowingly made complicated. They broke things down in a way that allowed humility to sneak in and do its quiet work. One idea from the Big Book still grounds me: an “unsellable inventory”—those defects, resentments, and selfish attitudes that will always weigh the business down. If we don’t clear those shelves, we risk collapse.

I often picture a tiny minimart: some shelves filled with things I’m proud to offer the world, and others crowded with items I’m surprised I still have out for sale. That’s the stuff I need to face. I only have so much shelf space. If I want room for things that truly align with my core instincts, something else has to go.

A personal inventory asks us to get honest about our defects, our negative patterns, and the ways our actions clash with what we value most. This kind of stock-taking reveals the destructive patterns of alcoholism and gives us the foundation for spiritual recovery, just as described in our book. And every time I revisit this process, I’m reminded that I’m still learning. Hopefully, that will always be true.

But there’s another truth I’ve learned, slowly, and sometimes grudgingly: I can’t see everything on my own. I need other perspectives. And that is exactly what group, district, and area inventories offer. Maybe what worked before doesn’t work anymore. Maybe someone shows up with a vantage point I never considered. Maybe a voice that once shaped our direction is no longer in the room. The body changes, and so does the wisdom within it.

So, whether the Area Inventory is still ahead of us or you’re reading this after the fact, my hope is the same: that we engage, or *engaged*, with curiosity and humility. That we speak honestly about what isn’t working and just as honestly about what could work. That we don’t get stuck repeating the problem but instead open ourselves to new possibilities.

And here’s the part I think we sometimes miss, myself included: an inventory without action is just paperwork. Once we’ve identified the items on Aisle B that don’t sell, are we actually removing them? Are we intentional about what replaces them?

If you’re reading this beforehand, I’m looking forward to a productive, positive, and teachable moment for all of us as we move into 2026. And if you’re reading this after we’ve completed it, I hope that was our shared experience. That we took the time to listen, to learn, and to grow together.

Because if there’s one thing I’ve learned from all these inventories, personal and collective, it’s that the process works best when we stay teachable. An honest inventory is a gift. Taking action on it, together, is where the miracle really happens.

The Group Inventory

A Group Inventory can be done in a handful of ways, and I recommend it be facilitated by someone outside your group, so there is less bias or agenda. Many groups use what are called “the thirteen questions,” from the AAWS pamphlet, The A.A. Group ...where it all begins (P-18, pg. 29-30). Reading these over, and reflecting on their use in the several group inventories I have facilitated, made me wonder, “What if there were “thirteen questions” for the Grapevine? The following are just a draft of what I thought [bias alert!] might be useful questions.

1. What is the basic purpose of the Grapevine?

2. What more can the group do to support the Grapevine?

3. Does the Grapevine attract alcoholics from different backgrounds? Are we seeking through the use of the Grapevine a good cross-section of our community, including those with special needs?

4. Do new members have access to the Grapevine, in print or digitally? To the podcast? If no, why not? What can we as a group do?

5. Do we emphasize how sponsorship and the Grapevine can be used together? How effectively? How can we do better?

6. Are we careful to preserve the anonymity of our group members and other A.A.s after they’ve been published in the Grapevine? Do we also leave the confidences they share in the Grapevine behind?

7. Do we take the time to explain to all members the value to the Grapevine print, app and podcast as part-and-parcel of our Twelfth-step efforts?

8. Are all members informed on how to submit Grapevine stories, what the upcoming topics and deadlines are, and where to find them? How to attend a writing workshop? How to request one be set up?

9. Mindful that holding office is a great responsibility not to be viewed as the outcome of a popularity contest, do we have a group Grapevine Representative? At the district level? Do we know who the Area Grapevine Chair is? Do our group or district rep know how to register with A.A. Grapevine? Do they know the benefits of registering?

10. Are we doing all we can to provide an attractive display for the Grapevine? Does the group provide information on the downloaded app, the podcasts, and the Carry the Message Project?

11. Does the group incorporate the Grapevine when participating in the

purpose of A.A.—as it relates to our three Legacies of Recovery, Unity, and Service?

12. What has the group done lately to bring the Grapevine to the attention of professionals in the community—the physicians, clergy, court officials, educators, and others who are often the first to see alcoholics in need of help?

13. How is the group fulfilling its responsibility to the Seventh Tradition, emphasizing the self-sufficiency of the Grapevine? Through subscriptions, or as one of the tiers of contribution?

The Transformative Power of Group Inventories

Reflections on Participation, Growth, and Lasting Change

Participating in group inventories has consistently proven to be a powerful tool for fostering unity, clarity, and growth within the fellowship. These inventories offer a structured opportunity for groups to reflect on their core values, identify their strengths, and candidly address areas needing improvement. In my experience, the inventory process often acts as a catalyst for groups to articulate their mission—sometimes for the first time—and to develop a shared sense of purpose.

For instance, I once belonged to a small step study group that, through the inventory process, discovered how much they valued welcoming travelers and being accessible to those staying downtown. This realization directly influenced our decision to find a new meeting space that remained within walking distance of local hotels, ensuring we maintained our commitment to inclusivity and convenience for visitors. In another case, a group I participated in recognized the importance of preserving the meeting’s character. As a result, we instituted a practice where the secretary and chairperson would call on homegroup members first, intentionally setting the tone and reinforcing the group’s unique spirit.

My experience as a District Committee Member (DCM) further underscored the value of group inventories. During one district inventory, I learned that General Service Representatives (GSRs) felt their opportunities to share about their groups were too limited. By listening to this feedback, I revised the meeting agenda to place GSR sharing at the beginning, rather than at the end where it was often rushed or omitted. This simple adjustment not only honored the voices of our GSRs but also enriched the overall district dialogue.

What stands out most about the group inventory process is the actionable insight it provides. The inventory itself is invaluable, but it’s the steps taken afterward—implementing changes, following through on commitments—that truly transform a group. Whether participating as a member, a leader, or a facilitator, I have found the inventory process to be a uniquely spiritual experience. It invites honesty, fosters deeper connection, and ultimately helps groups better align their actions with their values. The gratitude I feel for these opportunities is immense, as each inventory has left lasting positive impacts on

the groups I’ve served and on my own journey in service.

In my early sobriety I never attended business meetings and did not understand that my home-group was taking inventory on how the group, it’s members and trusted servants were taking care of the group and its members. How we were serving the group members, homegroup members, our meeting place, our literature, our coffee, as well as cooperating with groups in the same District and Area and the AA GSO.

When arriving in Seattle and taking a homegroup I was drawn to the middle of AA’s life raft and was not only curious about our organizations structure but how the traditions protect our groups and aid us each in personal and professional growth. My homegroup, Practice These Principles, a group that very much cared whether we were/are serving our members, their needs, our groups agreed upon format, our literature focus, welcoming newcomers, sponsoring those in need and reaching out to our community and other AA groups in cooperation and fellowship. I have also always been asked by my sponsors to participate in service to my home group, and I now suggest the same to my sponsees. It has been my experience that not only has PTP but many other groups I attend and attend their group business meetings as well as

inventories that the inventory template that most groups use is a set of 12/13 questions asked at each group yearly or bi-yearly inventory. These are important questions but not always pertinent to the individual group and their current challenges and issues. In the past 5 years, Practice These Principles and PTP – 4th dimension (online meeting) has begun to use facilitators that are willing to include or substitute questions in the inventory that have been much more key to our groups current state. For example: during the Covid Pandemic it was necessary to look at the challenges that came from becoming an online meeting, Supporting members who were not comfortable using ZOOM, How to collect the 7th tradition, creating service positions for zoom instructions, phone lists and other challenges. At the return to in-person meetings we struggled with members who wanted nothing to do with an ongoing online meeting and others who NEEDED to continue to protect their health and/or could no longer attend in-person meetings. Also, we found that many past members who lived in other places from the past came back to PTP during this time and wanted the online meeting to continue. These standard inventory questions were not specific to our changing needs. We were very lucky to find a facilitator who worked with our Inventory Committee to create new and important questions for our new needs and challenges of changing times in AA. This allowed us to eventually continue PTP in-person at the same church with the same Literature Based – 6 day per week structure and create a new group, PTP 4th Dimension online group. Serving the needs of different members as well as being cross populated by many of the same members.

Honestly, it has been through creative and willing groups servants as well as facilitators who have shown us new ways combined with standard inventory questions and our groups clear need to grow and change and really use the AA Group Inventory to drive those changes that has made both groups able to have a clear way forward and to respect all member’s needs.

I know that my home group, PTP 4th Dimension, has truly allowed our Group Inventory to drive the discussions and actions of our monthly business meetings. Members have the opportunity for input and a fellowship that acts on the decisions that it makes through our agendas and group conscience process. It has taught me so much about growth, change, acceptance, willingness and cooperation. Once again seeing that AA is the upside-down triangle making each member a board member, being heard and having a place to be of service to our fellow members and groups.

The A.A. Group Inventory

A group inventory is a spiritual tool that helps an A.A. group take stock of how well it is fulfilling its primary purpose: to carry the message to the alcoholic who still suffers. Much like a Fourth Step for a group, the inventory gives members the chance to look honestly, lovingly, and constructively at how the group functions.

During a group inventory, members reflect on questions related to A.A.’s Twelve Traditions—unity, leadership, participation, inclusiveness, finances, and how well the group welcomes and supports newcomers. The focus is not on fault-

finding but on learning, improving, and strengthening the group conscience.

Based on my experience facilitating district and group inventories—and participating in many others – groups consistently find the process revealing, enlightening, and spiritually renewing. When I facilitate, I use the 13-question guide found in the pamphlet “The A.A. Group, where it all begins”, which provides a simple, practical framework for discussion. These questions help members explore how well the group is applying the Traditions and where adjustments might strengthen unity and effectiveness.

A healthy group inventory helps:

- Keep the group aligned with A.A.’s principles
- Improve communication and trust among members
- Identify ways to better welcome and support newcomers
- Renew enthusiasm for service and participation
- Ensure the group remains a safe, inclusive place for all alcoholics

Many groups benefit from doing a group inventory annually or whenever the group feels stuck, divided, or ready to grow. Taking time to pause, reflect, and realign with the Traditions helps the group stay spiritually grounded and better equipped to carry the A.A. message.

Group Inventory

During my 24 sober years in Utah, we used to have an annual Steering Committee meeting at someone’s home. We would go through our agenda, all group activities, the service standing chair positions and have a pot luck. Since coming to Washington, I have participated in the Group and District Inventories. It took me a while, but I figured out they are the same thing without the food.

We were very committed to sticking to the Steering Committee changes and they certainly helped the group run much smoother, without as much politics. We kept the inventory with our meeting agenda and the chair would refer to them frequently. The District 39 Inventory last year did very well and we came away feeling very happy with the discussion and the changes. However, it seemed like we fell back to our old ways quickly.

I think the most important thing about doing a group inventory, district inventory or area inventory is the follow through. As they say, Talk is Cheap! Keeping a flyer or written sheet handy to keep the changes top of mind, is the key. That is why so many people know the Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions, we hang them up everywhere. It might be a good idea to read the highlights of the inventory at the area

Quarterly Check In’s or the group business meetings. Doing the inventory once a year and then not addressing it again tends to make us forgetful and fall back into our old habits. The older I get the more my old habits feel comfortable, but I believe repetition can teach an old service junkie new tricks.

Looking Back: My Experience with Our AA Group Inventory

In the past, my home group has, through group conscience, held a group inventory. At first, I wasn’t sure what to expect. I’d heard about the process, but participating in one was new to

me. Looking back, I’m grateful we took the time to do the inventory.

We gathered in our usual meeting space, but the atmosphere felt different—more intentional, more focused. As we began, we asked ourselves some tough questions: Were we truly welcoming to newcomers? Did we stick to AA principles in our meetings? Were we supporting each other as best we could?

I remember feeling nervous as I shared my thoughts (I always get nervous). It’s not easy to admit where we might be falling short, but I was encouraged by the honesty and kindness in the room. Some members pointed out areas for improvement, like making sure everyone gets a chance to speak and being more proactive in reaching out to those who miss meetings. Others expressed gratitude for the support they’d received.

What struck me most was the unity that emerged. Even when we discussed difficult topics, there was no blame—just a shared desire to grow and help each other. We celebrated our strengths and made plans to address our weaknesses. For example, we agreed to rotate service positions more often,

have a quarterly potluck, and to have visitor coins to hand out with our group name on them.

Participating in the group inventory reminded me that recovery is not just about individual progress—it’s about building a strong, supportive community. By holding ourselves accountable as a group, we reinforced the foundation that supports each member’s sobriety. I left that meeting feeling inspired and hopeful.

If your group hasn’t done an inventory yet, I encourage you to try it. It’s a powerful way to deepen trust, improve how you serve others, and recommit to the principles that make AA so meaningful.

Heading out the door now to the Rochester Group's, my home group's, annual Gratitude Banquet. Our way of thanking all of AA members throughout the district and elsewhere of being part of the recovery miracle. I'm thankful for having survived and thrived, to some degree, the first half of Panel 75 as dcm28. A role I have jokingly referred to as being the designated punching bag bridging District and Area business. This 'job', if I got it right is to pass back and forth ideas, concerns, demands, etc. from District 28 groups which sit atop the upside down triangle to the Area group located at a lower level descending down the triangle. We dcm members and other trusted servants make business decisions based on feedback from the groups. These decisions can determine what motions are put on docket for October Assembly ultimately passed or rejected

by all Area group GSR representatives. All decisions give our Delegate, located even lower on this triangle, consensual authority to make decisions at annual April NYC gathering. Hopefully with motions decided by unanimity.

Since I'm thinking out loud here, I'm just going to keep it simple. October Assembly tabled 3 floor motions until January 2026 business meeting. I have been reminded by my service sponsor that we are servants to our fellow alcoholics, not leaders who set policy. Therefore, if we prioritize these motions based on the upside down triangle, then the order of importance is clearly 1. District 25 firewall discrepancies, 2. Creation of Area 3rd Legacy Chair position, and 3. Change in future Assembly dates. How often have we heard from others or discussed with others about the 'Spiritual Tool Kit'? What tools are therein? How to use them? While thinking about these 3 motions and the impact they will and are having on our Area, I'm led to that tool kit looking for what would help. What I found felt like a wrench wrapped in obscurity. CAUTION: Handle with Care, this may be a monkey wrench!

Allow me to start with the least important, from my perspective, of the three. Moving the Assembly date. Though something to be dealt with, the reason it is a topic at all is because the Trustees, the place of the lowest point on the triangle, changed the submission date motions must be submitted to be considered for discussion at the big April pow wow. We know their reasons and justifications. However, it is not us that must appease them, but vice versa! If you think I'm being confrontational and don't like being told what to do, so be it. I'm not offended.

Secondly, the motion of creating a 3rd Legacy Chair in an Area where only 16 of the 44 Districts even have that Chair position seems like jumping the gun a bit. Although the district I represent is one of the 16, and I do in the long run support the idea, the prudent route would be to show the other 28 districts without that chair what the benefits of having one would do for their district body. When the majority feel the need for one, then act to create one. The 16 should not direct policy for the 44. That would be similar to Trustees influencing the changing of Assembly dates.

Thirdly, and by far the most important is the firewall issue, which frankly, I'm still confused about, brought to our attention by District 25. This should have precedence since, apparently, they are not getting the same Area service as the other 43 districts are receiving. All Districts, like home groups are autonomous. I think it is safe to assume most of the groups in D25 agree that this is an issue that needs to be discussed and resolved at the Area business quarterlies. If the decision is unfavorable to them, then a working compromise must be implemented to assure Area togetherness. All 3 motions are important for various reasons. Resolutions surely can be achieved. I believe Panel 75 can meet the challenge in round two.

So after spending year one being poked and jabbed, my year two approach will be to emulate Muhammad Ali. "I float like a butterfly, and sting like a bee". (M. Ali) Merry Christmas everyone or whatever you choose to celebrate. See you in Sequim. P.S. This is obviously a first draft.

Does the group do enough? Do we encourage sponsorship? Do the Homegroup members know what all needs to be done in cleaning and closing up the meeting space? Does the group provide a safe, attractive, and accessible meeting place? Is there a cross-section of the community we are in present in the meeting? Do newcomers stick around? What more can we do to carry the message? These are just some of the questions suggested for a Group Inventory, “The A.A. Group ... where it all begins” P-16. Doing a Group Inventory can be daunting, similar to how some of our own personal inventories were as we worked through the 12 Steps. There is lots of pre and post work needed to help the Group Inventory go as smooth as possible as well as have a lasting outcome. Asking someone unbiased to help guide or moderate the inventory. Making sure we plan accordingly for enough time and find a neutral meeting space. It can be helpful if you coordinate between everyone attending to have snacks and drinks. Once the Inventory is done, and your group has back the notes from each question you all then need to decide how to take back and work on what was learned. If you are anything like me this seems like an insurmountable body of work. Thankfully it’s a

team effort. Having every member’s voice heard, or at least as many as possible, is essential for a healthy Group Inventory. We all have a duty to share just as honestly at a Group Inventory as we do at a Meeting or our own Inventory. From this honesty we can gather an accurate appraisal of what the group can do better. The other great aspect is we don’t need to rush any step of the process, quite the opposite. Chris Belden

We Need The Group Inventory

I have been to several group inventories. They offer an excellent way to evaluate if the group is following the principles of the program. As the group discusses each suggestion, it becomes obvious where necessary action is needed. In one session, the lack of a greeter was a concern. The group wanted everyone to feel welcome. Another time the need for some signs to the front door was needed, as it was not easily available unless you had been coming to the meeting prior. The signs were painted and before each meeting, they are positioned for a new comer to find their way to the meeting.

Not continuing to use the suggested opening or other typical practice traditionally used can be identified, when others add or change it to their

opinion. If items are added or ignored, we would not be carrying the messenger to the newcomer. The inventory is a great reminder to the group to stay focused on the program during the meetings. Not following the program is not optional as all our wellbeing and sobriety is at stake. In addition, continuing to take a group conscious stops one person from taking over the focus of the group's needs. These and other issues need to be continually reviewed to keep the program on track.

Meetings at home or traveling bring a sense of belonging. When I am attending meetings in Hawaii, Australia, Oregon, or California I know I am in the right place by the consistency of the opening and procedures that were similar to my home group; I feel like I am home. It feels right.

The group inventory is similar to the personal inventory in that when something needs being identified to improve the meeting or our lives, we need to have a way to identify it and be open to the situation, to resolve the condition that has been brought to our attention.

If we do not have periodic group inventories, our program is in jeopardy. For that reason, taking the time to keep on target is essential to our wellbeing and recovery. If we go off the recommended path, we lose our unity and sobriety. When our minds are aligned in the program as our Creator and the Big Book provides for us, we have the support and ability to keep our sobriety.
